Jessica Dolan is a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Anthropology at McGill University. She is currently working on her dissertation, which explores the social, political, and spiritual foundations of Haudenosaunee environmental knowledge. She chose this area of research to contribute to the formation of culturallyappropriate environmental protection and restoration policies at Six Nations of the Grand River, and in other Haudenosaunee communities. She has done various kinds of community advocacy and service work in the United States and Canada for thirteen years. As in the Haudenosaunee oral tradition, Jessica believes that "environment" includes the total ecology of social and biological environments, so crosscultural advocacy for peace, justice and wellbeing is synergistic with processes of stewardship and protection of the natural world.
