Federal Petition process legislated under: <u>Auditor General Act, Section 22.</u>

Fisheries Act can be used for municipal water issues under federal petitions but not under the Ontario EBR:

- section 34(1), which describe the provisions to conserve and protect fish habitat that sustain Canada's fisheries resources,
- section 35(1), which prohibits the harmful alteration, disruption or destruction (HADD) of fish habitat,
- sections 36-42 which control the deposition of any deleterious substance to water frequented by fish

- **Contact your member of Parliament (MP).** This is a simple and direct way to communicate your questions or concerns to the federal government. To obtain contact information for your MP, consult the Parliament of Canada website.

Members of Parliament can also provide guidelines for submitting petitions to the House of Commons. These petitions are signed by Canadian residents and addressed to the House of Commons by a member of Parliament. They must concern a subject within the authority of the Parliament of Canada, the House of Commons, or the Government of Canada. Such petitions must meet requirements established by the rules and practices of the House.

- Contact the parliamentary committee responsible for your area(s) of concern. The House of Commons and the Senate convene committees on distinct subjects, including areas related to the environment and sustainable development. - Consider the federal government's *Access to Information Act*. The Act gives Canadians access to information held by federal departments responsible for their area of concern, with some exceptions. Each department has their own Access to Information and Privacy coordinators. For further information, refer to the following website, which lists the names and contact information

• Examine the Citizen Submission on Enforcement Matters mechanism of the North American Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC). This process enables the public to submit a request for review of any NAFTA partner when it appears to not be enforcing environmental law.
