The *rare* Charitable Research Reserve is a community driven 900+ acre urban land trust and environmental institute in Waterloo Region/Wellington, home to an incredible array of flora and fauna, with species that are ranked significant or at risk regionally, provincially, nationally and even globally. Since inception, *rare* has taken care of the land on behalf of the community through the use of Western tools in conservation, research and education. As *rare* becomes engaged in reconciliation with the Indigenous Peoples of Turtle Island

(North America), these pillars will equally include and value Indigenous ways of knowing and being — to become three strands of a strong braid. Together we will steward these lands with respect for generations past, present and those yet to come, intact in perpetuity with trees more than 250 years old, 24 habitat types, and 6 of 8 pre-settlement landscapes.
